3. Summary/Abstract

This report is prepared in relation to Subtask 7.3.1 "Link with similar initiatives at European level". The main objective of this task is the creation of links with relevant European initiatives and projects in order to give a wider outreach to RURITAGE activities, results and events and, at the same time, to exchange knowledge and learn from other projects.

This report provides information about networking activities carried out by RURITAGE consortium. The current document comprises the information for the whole duration of the project. Two interim versions of this report were prepared by the Task Leader (APRE) at M18 (November 2018) and M36 (May 2021) and shared with the WP7 Leader (ICLEI) and the Coordinator (UNIBO), to monitor the activities carried out and discuss future plans for the networking. Both interim reports are available in RURITAGE sharepoint. This report, as the final and comprehensive version of the networking report, provides information about both the mapping methodology applied and the concrete results and tangible outputs of the networking activities carried out throughout the project.

Moreover, this report include a Section (7) on outcomes of international cooperation actions, led by UNESCO (Subtask 7.3.2). UNESCO and ICLEI ensured high level outreach of RURITAGE result to high level country representatives and international organisations. Based on identified interests from countries, two events (training and workshop) were organised for stakeholders in Latin America and Caribbeans.

In summary, RURITAGE carried out networking activities with 56 EU projects (listed in Annex I – List of EU projects), 38 EU networks and initiatives (listed in Annex II– List of EU networks and initiatives) and reached 14 territories in LAC.



4. Mapping of relevant projects and initiatives at EU level

4.1 Mapping methodology

With the aim of giving RURITAGE results and events a broader outreach and to maximize their impact, relevant EU projects and initiatives were identified in the first three months of the project (June-September 2018). The identification of relevant projects and initiatives was a first crucial step to develop an effective and targeted strategy of networking.

Projects/initiatives were identified as pertinent to RURITAGE as following:

- 1. **Group 1:** Correlation to RURITAGE overall objectives and/or activities (crosscutting relation to RURITAGE)
- 2. Group 2: Specifically connected to at least one of RURITAGE Systemic Innovation Areas (SIAs)

Projects or initiatives belonging to the first group were identified by using the following keywords (alone or in combination):

- Rural regeneration
- Cultural heritage
- Rural development
- Sustainable tourism

Projects or initiatives belonging to the second group were identified using as keywords the six RURITAGE SIAs (alone or in combination with the group 1 keywords used to identify projects broadly related to RURITAGE):

- 1. Art & festival
- 2. Landscape
- 3. Local food
- 4. Migration
- 5. Pilgrimage
- 6. Resilience

The research was conducted on European Commission projects' database (<u>CORDIS</u>) and on databases/websites of other funding programs directed to some of the most relevant themes for RURITAGE, as cultural heritage, tourism or rural development (e.g. <u>Creative Europe</u>, the <u>European Network for Rural Development (ENRD)</u>, <u>Interreg Europe</u>, *etc.*). In addition, projects suggested by other consortium partners as well as by the Project Officer were considered.

For each project, the general description of the project objectives and activities, and any other additional information available online, was taken into account to assess if could be a good target for the networking activity. One of the selection criteria of the initial mapping was also the life-span of the projects, which should go at least until 2019 (as in early 2020 a second mapping exercise was carried out). Indeed, the methodology is meant as a flexible approach, which can be adapted to the progress of the project and project's emerging needs. Below, the main elements of the networking methodology are set out.

In **technical terms**, it was decided to primarily contact only the coordinators of the shortlisted projects, as they typically have the best overview of their projects and can take first decisions concerning networking with other projects. Further, the first contact is to be made via email, in order to give the chance to the contacted projects to get properly acquainted with RURITAGE activities (e.g. by exploring the RURITAGE website), prior to starting more detailed discussions about possible forms of collaboration. In the timeframe M1 – M18 (June 2018 – November 2019) APRE contacted via email about 40 projects and initiatives that were considered the most relevant for the RURITAGE ongoing activities. Following the first email, an online meeting is to be arranged with each project



expressing interest in the networking. The call is to be always preceded by careful studying of the contacted project, its website, social media and activities, to ensure that, during the first call concrete forms of collaboration, adjusted to the both project's objectives, planned actions, events, etc, can be offered.

To ensure that the contacted projects received clear and comprehensive information about RURITAGE networking potential, at the time of the first approach, APRE had prepared a list of RURITAGE activities that could be of direct interest for other projects and the basis for fruitful collaboration. The list is presented below in Figure 1 and it was updated as the project progressed. It was used as basis to be thoroughly discussed with each contacted project to properly define points of common interest with RURITAGE.

The mapping methodology developed at the beginning of the project proved to be efficient and was used also in the second reporting period of the task (M19 - M36), with small updates/modifications, as explained below:

- While until M18 the mapping was almost entirely carried out by APRE (as the Task leader) based on its contacts and networks, in the next reporting period (M19-M36, M37-M48) we relied to a bigger extent on the feedback from and networks of other Beneficiaries, especially those directly involved in Task 7.3. This resulted in continuous and comprehensive growing on the project's database, ensuring that all relevant projects and initiatives were timely identified and contacted.
- While until M18, the mapping focused primarily on relevant EU projects (mostly funded by Horizon2020, Creative Europe and Interreg Europe), in the next reporting period (M19-M36, M37-M48) the mapping was substantially extended with relevant European networks and initiatives, taking into account the following key themes: rural regeneration/development, cultural and natural heritage and agriculture.

It is worth noting, that in the third reporting period (M37-M48) the mapping was enhanced by spontaneous contacts and requests of networking from EU projects in the early stages of their activities, acknowledging the role of RURITAGE as a leading project in the context of heritage-driven rural regeneration.



4.2 Outcomes of the mapping

As a result of the mapping exercise described above, a total of **56 EU projects** were identified as relevant for RURITAGE. The projects are compiled in a database maintained by APRE in the RURITAGE SharePoint. After each reporting period (M18, M36), the projects database was updated to ensure that only active projects closely related to RURITAGE activities were included. The update exercise allowed us to filter out those projects that have not expressed their interest in RURITAGE activities or which never answered to our networking attempts. The relevant projects are listed in Annex I – List of EU projects of this report. For each project, the following information is specified: project's name, the life-span, SIA/cross-cutting theme and the funding scheme. More than half of the projects identified are H2020 funded projects. All other projects are distributed over other funding programs, in particular Interreg or Creative Europe.

A total of **38 EU networks and initiatives** have been identified and complied in a database maintained by APRE in the RURITAGE SharePoint. The selected networks and initiatives are listed in the Annex II— List of EU networks and initiatives of this report. In the database, for each of them, the following information is specified: weblink, contact details and the date of last monitoring of relevant activities and events to be shared with RURITAGE consortium.



5. Networking activities

5.1 Initial networking steps taken

On the basis of the mapping activity described in section 4 of the current report and in accordance with the networking methodology developed at the beginning of the project, APRE approached the representatives of the selected projects and networks/initiatives starting from mid-October 2018 and continued to keep contacts with them.

One of the main objectives of the RURITAGE networking is to ensure that **RURITAGE networking activities are closely connected with other tasks of the project,** in order to maximize the impact of RURITAGE activities and give them the widest possible visibility, and, at the same time, to establish fruitful connections with relevant actors in the field of heritage-driven rural regeneration so to expand the knowledge exchange beyond RURITAGE consortium. Following this objective, the first step of networking activities was related to the call for Additional Role Models (Task 1.1), which opened in October 2018. Among all selected projects, APRE had identified 12¹ initiatives, whose profile was matching the conditions of the call for Additional Role Models and which, potentially, could be interested in joining RURITAGE in that capacity. Subsequently, the shortlisted projects have been approached with an invitation email, introducing the RURITAGE project and the objectives of the call for Additional Role Models. Following this email, the majority of projects expressed their interest and asked for additional information and explanation, which was provided to them during separate phone calls arranged by APRE in November and December 2018. A similar approach was applied in relation to the call for Additional Replicators (Task 6.2) in February 2019, whereby six projects² have been selected and contacted by APRE with an invitation to the call for Replicators. One of those projects - Saint Olav's Mainland Route – became an Additional Replicator.

Starting from March 2018, APRE commenced an **intense networking campaign**, whereby the projects, which have not been contacted with reference to the call for Additional Role Models and Replicators, have been approached by APRE. March 2019 was chosen as an adequate date to start this activity as at time the several RURITAGE deliverables and results were already produced and the RURITAGE website was fully operational and populated with up-to-date information about the project, providing the interested projects with valuable information about RURITAGE objectives, activities and recent results. As a result of the networking campaign, 23 projects have been initially approached by APRE, following the networking methodology.

In November 2018, RURITAGE participated to the **Fair of European Innovators in Cultural Heritage** where first contacts have been made with several projects, namely, FEAL project, Emotive project, representatives of several cultural routes (https://www.coe.int/en/web/cultural-routes/by-theme), Hercules (https://www.hercules-landscapes.eu/), CHIME (http://chimeproject.eu/) and PLUGGY (https://chimeproject.eu/).

In addition, and in parallel, to the above mentioned steps, RURITAGE also carried out its networking activities based on the **previously established networks** of its partners, especially networks of UNIBO and ICLEI. This cooperation resulted in concrete networking activities with the following Horizon 2020 projects: ROCK, ROBUST, OpenHeritage and CLIC (for detailed information about those networking activities, see section 5.2).

5.2 Two levels of cooperation

The networking activities with projects firstly approached for the cooperation were carried out on two levels:

5.2.1 Level 1 – close collaboration

This level of collaboration covers co-organization of events with other projects and participation in each other's events, including invitations to present RURITAGE at other projects' events, as well as drafting of common papers/statements. All those projects and their respective networking activities are described on the RURITAGE website, in the section entitled 'Networking'. As of June 2022, there are 20 projects in this section of RURITAGE website.

5.2.2 Level 2 – regular cooperation

This level of collaboration covers mutual following on social media, and exchange of information about the projects' progress and results via emails and calls. This level of collaboration includes also invitations to participate in events organized (or co-organized) by RURITAGE as well as invitations to RURITAGE webinars and other events relevant for entities outside the consortium (e.g. summer schools or the master programme).

5.3 RURITAGE networking methodology – updates and novelties

The networking methodology, initially set out in the first 18 months of the project, was then updated and adjusted according to the outcomes of the previous networking activities. In particular, this section of the report provides information about:

- the updates and novelties that have been introduced to the networking methodology and activities after M19 of the project, and
- an overview of concrete networking activities carried out and their outcomes and tangible results.

5.3.1 Identification of relevant EU networks and initiatives

While in the first 18 months of the project, the networking task focused mostly on collaboration with relevant EU projects, afterwards, RURITAGE networking activities have been extended to cover also relevant EU networks and initiatives active in the field of: rural regeneration, local development, cultural and natural heritage and agriculture. The first mapping of those networks and initiatives has been prepared in cooperation with WP7 leader (ICLEI) in M22 of the project and the mapping has been subsequently updated on a monthly basis. The selected networks and initiatives are compiled in a database maintained by APRE in the RURITAGE SharePoint. For each network/initiative, the following information is specified: name, web link, contact details and the date of last monitoring. Currently, the database contains 38 networks and initiatives (see Annex II– List of EU networks and initiatives for details).

5.3.2 Continuous collaboration with relevant EU projects

The two-level cooperation, as described in section 5.2 Two levels of cooperation, has been maintained throughout the whole duration of the project. Close-level collaboration covers co-organization of events with other projects and participation to each other events, including invitations to present RURITAGE at other projects' events, as well as drafting of common papers/statements. Regular collaboration covers, among others, mutual following on social media and periodic/ad hoc exchange via emails and calls of information about the projects' progress, results and events.

5.3.3 Monthly monitoring and updates about networking activities




Figure 2 - Example of EUnetworking post on DRHH

In order to ensure that the EU networking task ran smoothly and that all potential collaboration activities were timely and effectively addressed, websites and social media of the mapped projects and networks/initiatives were screened by the Task Leader (APRE) on a monthly basis. In case interesting events/activities/project materials are identified:



 the RURITAGE beneficiaries were immediately informed through the Digital Rural Heritage Hub (DRHH), using a dedicated hashtag '#EU networking'. At the time of the preparation of this report (June 2022), 75 messages with the mentioned hashtag have been uploaded on the DRHH (see Figure 2):

- A Google Calendar of Events has been created by the Task Leader (APRE) in collaboration with WP7 Leader (ICLEI) and WP7 partners. Following the monthly monitoring of projects and networks/initiatives, the selected events relevant for RURITAGE activities are entered into the calendar, indicating who, when, how and at which event will represent RURITAGE. This allows for effective coordination of RURITAGE partners representing the project at external events, ultimately increasing the outreach of the project's activities to the external public.
- The mapped projects and networks/initiatives were periodically (every 3-4 months) informed, through dedicated emails, about developments in the RURITAGE project, to ensure to provide them with the recent projects results and materials. In addition, selected projects and networks/initiatives were also contacted on an hoc basis when necessary (e.g. for a promotion of a specific project activity like the RURITAGE Photo Contest or regarding participation, as speakers, in RURITAGE public events like webinars).

The results of the carried out networking activities are described below, in section RURITAGE networking activities - outcomes of the report.

5.3.4 Establishment of qualitative networking KPIs

Although the Description of Action does not foresee any KPIs in relation to subtask 7.3.1 on EU Networking, after the first reporting period (M18), the Task Leader (APRE) together with WP7 Leader (ICLEI) decided to set KPIs for the task, in order to more effectively plan and implement the networking activities. The following categories of KPIs have been established:

- Attendance of online events organized by other EU projects and networks/initiatives. If possible, mentioning RURITAGE in Q&A sessions or chat discussions
- Presentation of RURITAGE news bits in newsletters/blogs of other EU projects and networks/initiatives
- Presentations of RURITAGE at external events organized by other EU projects and networks/initiatives



Each year, APRE and the WP Leader (ICLEI) revised the KPIs and established together the most effective strategy to achieve them, to make the networking effort the most focused and targeted as possible.

5.4 RURITAGE networking activities - outcomes

This section presents the main results and tangible outputs of the networking activities carried out throughout the duration of the project, according to the KPIs established in the second reporting period (see Section 5.3.4). Section 5.4.1 describes the presentation of RURITAGE in newsletters/blogs and/or scientific journals as result of the collaboration with other EU projects and networks/initiatives, while section 5.4.2 provides an overview of RURITAGE representation in external events organized by other EU projects and networks/initiatives. Section 5.4.3 provides an overview of joint activities between RURITAGE and other EU projects and networks/initiatives, while, finally, Section 5.4.4 provides information about external events attended by RURITAGE in the framework of subtask 7.3.1.

5.4.1 RURITAGE represented in external newsletters/blogs and scientific journals

As a result of collaboration with **SPOT** and **IMPACTOUR** projects – both working on the topic of sustainable and cultural tourism – RURITAGE was invited to prepare three scientific papers in the special issue of the **Sustainability Journal**³.  - 5.4.3 Joint activities between RURITAGE and other EU projects and networks/initiatives
- 1) ROCK and RURITAGE signed a Memorandum of Understanding whereby both projects undertake to: (i) exchange good practices and experience in urban and rural contexts, (ii) organize joint project events, (iii) jointly draw a European Vision paper for urban and rural regeneration through Cultural and Natural Heritage. In June 2018, RURITAGE and ROCK gathered for the first time in Berlin, on the occasion of the first European Cultural Heritage Summit in order to explore together with other 7 projects on cultural heritage, the connections between European funded projects on cultural heritage and its valorization at the European level. The projects took this further on 15-16 November 2018 in Brussels at the Fair of European Innovators in Cultural Heritage, where they gathered input to support the newly founded Urban Agenda Partnership for Culture and Cultural Heritage.
- 2) Focused on rural-urban linkages, the **ROBUST** project shares the RURITAGE objectives related to ensuring sustainable development and incisive growth of rural areas in Europe and beyond. One of the main points of connection between the two projects are activities related to sustainable and local food production. In **April 2019**, RURITAGE participated to the 29th Breakfast at Sustainability's titled: "Fostering the Circular Food Economy through Stronger Rural-Urban Linkages", co-organized by ROBUST. The event aimed at exploring how rural-urban linkages can be strengthened to improve city-region synergies and sustainability, support rural economies, and promote a circular food economy. The RURITAGE Coordinator took part in the Panel discussion and shared some interesting international examples of rural regeneration processes that include sustainable food systems and cultural heritage. Details about the event and its main conclusions are available here.
- 3) A joint high-level event between RURITAGE, ROCK, ILUCIDARE and CLIC projects took place in November 2019 in Brussels to combine the findings and networks of those projects and thus leverage the outcomes to a higher level and wider public. A dedicated session is foreseen for RURITAGE and ROCK to discuss urban-rural regeneration and present the draft paper on European Vision for urban and rural regeneration through Cultural and Natural Heritage.
- 4) Since **PLUGGY** enables the citizens of Europe, including in its less developed regions, to be actively involved in cultural heritage activities, several RURITAGE Replicators and Role Models have been invited to upload their stories on the PLUGGY Social Platform. RURITAGE is also listed in the Liaison section of the PLUGGY website.



- 5) On 8 July 2020, RURITAGE organized a webinar titled "Thinking beyond the COVID-19 crisis: heritage-based opportunities for rural regeneration", where representatives of, inters alia, European Commission, Council or Europe and ENRD were invited as speakers. This module focuses on helping the project group to design a common dissemination plan for the portfolio and to carry out the actual dissemination of the portfolio results.
- 8) In collaboration with Task 2.5 'Digital knowledge sharing and mutual learning on the Digital RHH', a series of RURITAGE webinars called 'Rural Connections knowledge exchange with EU Rural projects' was created. It is a set of three webinars involving RURITAGE Role Models and Replicators and a group of European rural projects. 6. RURITAGE Final Conference

The RURITAGE Final Conference took place at UNESCO HQ in Paris, on 8-10 June 2022, to present all the outcomes of the RURITAGE project (see RURITAGE Deliverable D7.7 Final conference, forthcoming in August 2022). The second day of the Conference included the workshop "EU Rural Regeneration Workshop", organized by APRE in collaboration with RURITAGE sister projects in the framework of the networking activities carried out in Task 7.3.1 (see the workshop agenda in Annex III - EU Rural Regeneration Workshop).

The workshop aimed at presenting results of regeneration led strategies to EU regional and national stakeholders providing some examples of locally based and community driven rural regeneration from different perspectives and discussing Rural Development and Regeneration within the European Union Agenda. It consisted of two sessions:

- The first session, "Rural territories in EU funded projects: inspiration from Local Communities", focused on the role of local communities in rural areas. It gave an overview of some concrete examples of locally based activities triggering rural development, in the context of EU funded projects. Taking part in this session were: RURITAGE, AURORAL, INCULTUM, Be.CULTOUR and DESIRA.
- The second session, "Rural Development and regeneration within European Union Agenda", focused on the policies on rural development with a particular attention to the role of communities in the future scenarios of rural areas. A roundtable took place representatives of the European Commission (DG AGRI), UNESCO, SHERPA project and RURITAGE.

First session

Given the focus of the first session on local communities, projects encompassing close collaboration with rural local communities (e.g. co-creation activities, living labs, local hubs, etc), were invited to participate to the workshop. Examples of the impact that their project had at local level were discussed during this session. In particular:

- RURITAGE introduced the local hubs (Replicators, Role models and Additional Replicators) focusing
 on what impact the hubs had at local level thanks to the project,
- **AURORAL** presented the project's approach and its ecosystem, giving a final overview of the lessons learnt so far in their pilots, with a specific pattern in mind: *from co-innovate to co-invest*,
- **INCULTUM** showed the key role and challenges of tourism within the project, focusing the presentation on two pilots: Altiplano de Granada (Spain) and Campina de Faro (Portugal). A new specific *INCULTUM "product"* in each pilot, as well as the *participatory approach*, were the main points that characterized these local experiences,
- Be.CULTOUR brought some inspiration from Serbia on stage, talking about the project's transversal
 innovation approaches and emerging trends in Cultural Tourism. Local stakeholders from the private,
 public, academic and civil society sector are involved in the development of a local Action Plan aimed
 at circular cultural tourism,
- **DESIRA** presented the Flander pilot case, highlighting the main emerging questions in those rural regions, including *tensions between natural and cultural heritage*, *distrust of governments* and the *potential for digital technologies*.

Second session

The focus of this session was on the policies on rural development and their link to the future of rural areas. The session was a roundtable that started with a statement from each speaker about one key aspect they would like to see happening in EU rural areas before 2040. The speakers discussed interesting points such as: the key role of *empowerment* and *awareness* at local level, *data* as a trigger for local-centered policies, the integration of culture in rural development and the need for a *mentality shift* about rural areas. After this first round of initial statements, speakers were invited to discuss about how to build policies supporting rural areas in going beyond agriculture, farming, forestry, and fishing and the role that heritage can play in improving rural areas. The discussion highlighted how *innovation is not only technology driven*, but embeds other dimensions, such as the social one,



which has to be taken into consideration. Moreover, the need to distinguish between different levels of governance and policies when reflecting on rural areas, and to collect data about those areas, have been highlighted, in order to have a better picture of their real situation and, in turn, their needs in terms of policies. One final thought has been dedicated to culture and heritage as the glue connecting communities.



7. International cooperation outside EU

In line with RURITAGE Communication strategy, UNESCO, ICLEI, APRE and other partners ensured that primary and secondary policymakers and public institutions (see in a Table below) are fully informed about RURITAGE.

UNESCO used its direct links with its Member States, through a network of Permanent Delegations and National Commissions, to organize the information session on "Rural Regeneration" for UNESCO Member States during the Ruritage Final Conference at UNESCO HQ. More details in the according Deliverable 7.7 on the Final Conference Report.

Moreover, on 07 July 2021, UNESCO organised an additional information session for <u>UNESCO Country Groups</u>, particularly interested in RURITAGE tools/solutions.

ICLEI created cooperation with the countries covered by the European Neighbourhood Policy (ENP). It identified relevant conferences and events in the ENP region that were most suitable for disseminating the RURITAGE methodologies and tools. It also monitored the challenges that non-EU areas face in taking up the tools and knowledge from RURITAGE by sharing project outcomes with the additional Replicators from ENP regions (selected in Task 6.2) and support them in integrating these into their respective areas. This will result in Deliverable D7.6, which will draw key lessons for the CNH-led rural regeneration outside of the EU.



Global awareness through the celebration of UN international days

Outreach to the international community was further ensured through synergies within thematic UN and UNESCO International days:

- 18 April International Day for Monuments and Sites
- 22 April International Mother Earth Day
- 5 June World Environment Day (also celebrated by UNESCO)
- 18 June Sustainable Gastronomy Day
- 27 September World Tourism Day
- 13 October International Day for Disaster Reduction (also celebrated by UNESCO)

In practice, international actions included mainly thematic on-line social media campaigns, linking RURITAGE actions with thematic of UN days.

7.2 Capacity building outside EU: training and workshop in Latin America

Based on Member States' interest and their priorities in line with UNESCO's Natural Science programmes in regions, the two on-line events were held in January and April 2022 and aimed at sharing and considering key challenges for heritage-led strategies for rural development in Latin America and Caribbeans (LAC), examining regional good practices and lessons learned together with challenges and potential pathways for the uptake of innovative solutions, such as the RURITAGE model (the full report is available on —line https://es.unesco.org/sites/default/files/regional workshop training mtd summary report final.pdf). Events were organised by UNESCO's Section for Earth Sciences and Geo-Hazard Risk Reduction together with UNESCO's Science Bureau for Latin America and the Caribbean (Montevideo) together with RURITAGE experts.

During "Regional Policy Workshop on Cultural and Natural Heritage for Rural Regeneration in Latin America and the Caribbean", which was held on 26-27 January 2022 on-line from Montevideo, participants shared good practices for rural development based on cultural and natural heritage from LAC and EU countries and examined experiences, challenges and solutions from various countries in the LAC region on enhancing rural development through the integration of cultural and natural heritage in the post-COVID19 context.

The interest in the RURITAGE methodology on the part of participants of the January workshop, resulted in a training workshop dedicated to the "Enhancement of Cultural and Natural Heritage for Rural Regeneration" on 20-21 April 2022, hosted on-line from Montevideo. The training invited representatives of UNESCO Sites in LAC for further exploration of their territories potential to undergo the heritage-led transformation process. 14 territories were selected through the open call for participation. Participants from the LAC region learnt in detail about the RURITAGE model, methodologies and tools for rural regeneration in view of their regional application. By the end of the training, a preliminary Action plan for rural regeneration was outlined for each territory.

8. Conclusions

This deliverable represents a report describing the networking activities carried out during RURITAGE implementation to establish synergies with other EU funded projects and to maximize the impact of RURITAGE results, through joint activities with similar projects.

Overall, networking and building synergies with other projects has proven to be very effective during RURITAGE implementation. Being a complex project with several partners and different aspects all equally important in its approach, a high level of effort was dedicated at the beginning of the project, in the identification of relevant projects through a mapping methodology that was regularly applied and that led to the establishment of a living database constantly kept updated.

Beyond the mapping, the importance of keeping regular contact with sister projects has been evident since the beginning. Regular exchanges and mutual effort led both to promotion of each other's results and to learn from each other's experiences. Finally, the organization of a joint workshop with sister projects during the RURITAGE final conference was a great opportunity to present their results to the whole RURITAGE community gathered at the Conference and to discuss future opportunities for collaboration.


